INTRODUCTION

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Wholefome Water, &c.

The Committee for Superintending the introduction of Wholesome Water into the City,

REPORT,

HAT, from the nature of the bufinefs which they have been called on to direct, it has been impracticable, during its progreffive flate, to render as frequent and detailed reports to Councils as would otherwife have been agreeable. While the works were fo circumflanced that every part of them was daily affuming a new afpect, the difficulty of furnifhing very minute and complete flatements of the expenditures and condition of each department, muft, in an undertaking fo extensive, interefting, and novel, appear obvious to every one.

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In addition to the information which has, from time to time, been laid before Councils, the committee have now the pleafure of prefenting a view of the fubject, which they flatter themfelves will be acceptable. It contains an accurate flatement of the fituation of the works on the first of

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October.

The BASON may be confidered as completed, except as to the coping of the Wall. It is entirely out of danger, and conceived to be fufficiently fubftantial to refift the utmost force of the waters, in the most rigorous feasons. The coping may be finished before Winter, as part of it is already done and preparations made for the completion of the refidue. The whole cost of this article, fo far as it has gone, is twenty-two thousand one hundred and feventy-eight dollars, and thirty-three cents. The additional expence will be triffing.

The CANAL which leads from the Bafon and connects with the lower Tunnel is completed, except as to coping the wall and fluice. Stone has been collected for that ufe, and may be wrought and fet at any time. There has been expended in digging, walling, and materials, on this object, three thousand four hundred and thirty-eight dollars, and fixty-nine cents; befides which the

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CANAL SLUICE cost two thousand two hundred and fixty-four dollars, and forty-three cents.

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The LOWER TUNNEL wants nothing but an iron grating to render it complete. It coft fix thousand nine hundred and twenty-one dollars, and ninetythree cents.

The Lower Engine House is finished, fo far as respects the purpose to which the Engine is now applied. When the extra power shall be used, for mechanical purpofes, it will be neceffary to complete the cellar at the north end; but this is rather a matter of concern to the contractor than to the Corporation. This building was crected on a larger fcale, and at a confiderable increase of expence for his accommodation, and, whenever the extra power shall come into operation, this will form a fair item of charge against the party who may use it. The house cost eleven thousand one hundred and fixtyone dollars, and fixty-four and an half cents. The ftone for walling up the cellar is in readinefs, and the doors and window fashes nearly prepared to be fixed in their places.

The ENGINE WELL in this houfe coft nine hundred and fifty-two dollars, and fixty-eight and an half cents. A fmall additional expence will be incurred in coping this well and the pump chamber adjacent to it. The UPPER TUNNEL may require fome pointing. In other respects it is finished, and cost twentyfix thousand one hundred and twenty dollars, and fifteen and an half cents.

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The CENTRE-SQUARE ENGINE HOUSE has already cost forty thousand five hundred and thirtytwo dollars and feventy-one cents. It is not quite completed; but nearly all the marble is fet or prepared, and may, together with the mafonry, be finished this fall. The Carpentry is also in a state of great forwardness, and may be accomplished in the Winter. It is probable that, in addition to the fums. which have been expended on this building, the marble mafon will have a demand for about eight thousand dollars, for marble prepared but not yet meafured. The permanent Refervoir, ordered by the committee to be of timber, is now fitting up in this house, and included in the expence. It will be ready to receive the water in the course of two or three weeks.

In the DISTRIBUTION much difficulty has been experienced on account of the leakage of the pipes of conduit, and the devices connected with them. Most of those difficulties have been furmounted. Perfeverance, and that knowledge which is only to be be acquired by experience, will, it is hoped, finally prevail over the reft. In the opinion of fome gentlemen, iron has been thought to be the beft material for pipes; and, in order to procure a fair experiment, the committee have obtained a few feet, which are now at the Centre-fquare, and appear to be well caft. Directions have been given to place thefe pipes, fourteen in number, each fix feet long, under the greateft preffure of the water, in order to prove a method of fecuring their joints, which it is fuppofed will be fubftantial, and cheaper than the common mode.

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The plan of the HVDRANTS that were first used has been wholly rejected, and another, which anfwers better, fubstituted. Of the latter thirty-feven are now fixed in different parts of the city, and fix more are in readiness for the fame use.

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The number of private houfes fupplied with Schuylkill water is fixty-three, of which twentyfeven belong to applicants, and thirty-fix to fubferibers to the loan. Four breweries and one fugar refinery alfo draw their fupply from the fame fource. Nor is there a doubt but the great and increasing value of the water, for culinary and other purposes, will induce a very general demand for it, whenever the distribution shall be more widely extended, and be in a more perfect state.

Under this head of expence is included the pipes of Conduit, and all the devices attached to them, the distributing cheft, and the defcending main leading to it from the refervoir in the Centrefquare Engine-houfe. The whole expence now incurred is thirty-one thousand four hundred and twenty-two dollars and twenty-two cents. There are now laid twenty-nine thousand nine hundred and fixty-three feet of pipe in different parts of the city, and it is a very defirable object to have the diftribution as generally extended the enfuing feafon as circumstances will allow, not only as it respects the increase of the Corporate revenue, but the convenience and accommodation of the citizens. The impracticability of procuring fuitable logs laft Spring, prevented the committee from laying as many as they could have withed, and as would have been advifable.

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The ENGINES have coft the Corporation thirtyone thousand eight hundred and eighteen dollars, and thirty-two cents, exclusive of nine hundred and forty-two dollars and eighty-one cents paid for the frames on which they are supported. Hitherto they have operated well, nor can there be a doubt of their fully answering the purposes of the city.

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The committee have given directions for the immediate erection of two additional boilers, agreeably to the original defign, to guard against any inconvenience which might arise from accidents to those which are in use. They are manufactoring at the expence of the Contractor for the Engines, and his account will accordingly be charged with all the monies which may be disbursed in their completion.

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The Engines cannot, in their prefent condition, pump three millions of gallons of water in each and every twenty-four hours; but they may, by an enlargement of the working barrels of the pumps, be eafily made to throw up even a larger quantity: and the Contractor is bound, whenever the Corporation fhall require it, fo to alter the Engines that they fhall pump the quantity required by contract.

The fituation of Nicholas I. Roofevelt, in relation to his engagements with the Corporation, and particularly refpecting the future maintenance of the Engines, the ufe of the extra power of the one neareft Schuylkill, and the leafe of certain contiguous lots of ground, will demand the early and deliberate attention of those who may here-

after compose the Councils of the city. His contract for their erection and completion has not been fully complied with, and therefore the original fecurity taken, by the mortgage of his estate at Soho, remains in force. Until that contract shall be fatisfactorily fulfilled in all its parts, and good, approved and fufficient fecurity given for the maintenance and repair of the Engines, in conformity to the terms and conditions mutually stipulated, he cannot enter on the Leafe of the lots and extra power. Since the Engines have commenced their operations the committee have furnished them with fuel and attendance. The fums which have been fo expended amount to five thoufand nine hundred and fixty-fix dollars, and feventy-two cents, and have been charged to Mr. Roofevelt. From this fum is to be deducted the flipulated price for a fupply of water, on the terms already contracted for. As this gentleman has not yet furnished the means for keeping the Engines in motion, nor confequently entered on the leafe of the lots and extra power, it has become effential to the interest of the city, and the proper understanding of the parties, that an explicit and early determination be had on these several points. Frequent effays have been made by the committee to 1 333 accomplifh

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accomplish that object, but have not been attended with the defired effect. They prepared an article of agreement, defignating and establishing the principles of the leafe, &c. which was submitted to Mr. Roofevelt fome months past, but remains unattended to and unexecuted.

The Engineer, by fpecial articles of agreement, was entitled to receive fix thoufand three hundred and fifty dollars as a full compensation for his fervices, on the completion of the work in all its parts. This fum he has drawn for, and it has been paid to him within about twelve dollars. It is proper in this place to obferve, that he demanded one thoufand nine hundred and twenty-five dollars more than his ftipulated compensation, on grounds which the committee deemed inadmiffible. The demand was, therefore, rejected. The falary of John Davis, who has been with the committee from the commencement of the undertaking, and whofe employment as clerk of the works has been very effential. and fatisfactory, amounts to two thousand three hundred and thirteen dollars. And the falary of James Todd, the accomptant, an officer equally deferving and ufeful, has, during the fame period, amounted to one thousand nine hundred dollars. And there has been paid to another perfon, as a falary, three hundred and feventy-two dollars, and feventy-five cents.

Notwithstanding a distinct head of the feveral objects of expence has been carefully preferved, yet it has happened that expences have been incurred, which, although chargeable to the whole, could not with facility and clearness be affigned in the proper proportion to the parts. Thus, there has been paid for fcaffolding;-fhops for the accommodation of the different workmen employed; -lime houfes; -fences; -tools and utenfils; including alfo all the wages paid to the Carpenters, the fum of fixteen thousand three hundred and five dollars, and twenty-nine cents. To the Smiths, including expences of erecting forges, coft of coals, iron, &c. two thousand three hundred and twentynine dollars, and twelve cents. To men employed in fawing fcantling, &c. nine hundred and thirtyfeven dollars, and fixty-fix cents. For glafs and other materials for the buildings, fix hundred and fixty-nine dollars, and feventeen cents. And for Shingles, fome of which have been ufed in both buildings, and fome remain unufed, five hundred and fixty-five dollars, and forty-one cents.

The Centre-fquare has been partially levelled and planted with trees, with the view of affording an agreeable and ufeful place of recreat in to the citizens. The expence attending this bject amounts

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mounts to one thousand one hundred and ninetyfive dollars, and eighty-two cents.

To the workmen liquor has been fupplied to the amount of eight hundred and ninety-eight dollars, and forty-four cents. To the marble mafon there has been paid, on account of marble prepared but not meafured, eight hundred and nineteen dollars, and fixty-five cents. Some materials have been fold to individuals who ftill ftand charged, on that account, with one hundred and thirty-fix dollars, and eighty-four cents.

Other expences have arifen from the purchase of stationary, advertizing, printing water loan certificates, making out water tax books, drawing mortgages, contracts, &c. These amount to one thousand seven hundred and ninety-fix dollars, and seventy-fix cents.

The total amount of expences incurred on account of the Water-works, is TWO HUNDRED AND TWENTY THOUSAND, THREE HUN-DRED AND TEN DOLLARS, AND FIFTY-FIVE AND AN HALF CENTS;* but this fum comprehends

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feventeen thousand three hundred and feventy-five dollars, and fixty-two cents, debts due for materials, &c. furnished for the use of the works, and charged to the feveral heads enumerated. The amount which it is fuppofed will be due to the marble mason, when his work shall be measured, is not taken into this calculation, but will be an addition to it. Befides this, there is due to the workmen for five weeks wages, one thoufand one hundred and ninety-nine dollars, and thirty-eight cents. And there is also owing to fundry perfons, for bills not yet produced, a fum which it is fuppofed will not exceed feven hundred dollars.

For a more detailed view of this fubject, the committee refer to the books and papers at the Water-office, under the direction of the accomptant, which will be found to contain a very accurate account of all the expenditures relative to the water works.

Councils are not unapprized of the fources from whence the committee have drawn their fupplies, nevertheless it may be proper to give a concife view of them, for the information of the members. to on a finish of the farmer fire for the
