To the Presidents and Members of the Select and Common Councils.

GENTLEMEN,—

THE City Commissioners respectfully lay before Councils, a Statement of their Accounts for 1825 ; an Estimate of the probable expense for 1826 ; and a copy of the City Rental ; to which they have annexed such remarks as have occurred to them.

The Ordinances and Resolutions of Councils, requiring them to perform certain duties, are also noticed, as follow:—

First. The Resolution, passed January 13th, authorizing them “to alter and “improve the Sinks at the intersection of Fourth and High Streets, that they may “be better adapted to the purposes intended, and rendered less offensive to the “citizens.” This Resolution has been complied with, and the alterations made fully answer the purposes contemplated by the improvement.

Second. The Resolution, passed January 27th, 1825, directing them “to lease “Vine Street Wharf to Thomas Walton, for 1,100 dollars *per annum*, for three “years, payable quarterly,” has been complied with, and the necessary security taken for the payment of the rent, as required by said Resolution.

Third. The Resolution, passed same date, directing them “to lease Mulberry “Street Wharf to Samuel Grant, for one year,” has also been complied with.

Fourth. An Ordinance, passed January 27th, directing them “to fix the stands “for the sale of Fruit and Garden Seeds, on the south side and near the east end “of the Market House between Third and Fourth Streets, under the eaves of the “building,” has been attended to.

Fifth. An Ordinance, passed January 27th, authorizing them “to alter the “Boxes under the Stalls in High Street Market between Fourth and Sixth Streets, “similar to those in the Market Houses between Sixth and Eighth Streets ; and to “remove the upright Boxes standing against the brick pillars in said Market Houses “between Fourth and Sixth Streets,” has also been attended to.

Sixth. The Resolution, passed February 24th, directing them “forthwith to “do such repairs as may be necessary to the Public Wharf at Walnut Street,” has been attended to.

Seventh. The Resolution, passed March 10th, directing them “to carry into “effect the repairs and alterations in the City Hall, according to the plan submitted “by the Commissioners and projected by Mr. Haviland,” has been complied with. The Commissioners, agreeably to instructions of a Joint Committee of Councils, entered into contract with Mr. John Haviland to complete the same for 2,200 dollars. Other alterations, not contemplated when the contract was made, including a room for the deposit of stolen goods, &c. increased the expenditure to 2,548 dollars, 72 cents.

Eighth. The Resolution, passed March 10th, directing them "to cause such repairs as may be necessary, to be put upon the Wharf at Vine Street," has been attended to; the expense of which is not included in the expenditures of 1825, as the cost has not been ascertained from the wharf-builders.

Ninth. An Ordinance, passed 24th March, directing them "to construct or cause to be constructed, a good and substantial brick Culvert, of a circular form, and of sufficient capacity, (not more than four feet six inches in the clear,) commencing at the Culvert now existing in Tenth Street, and running thence along Vine Street to intersect the Culvert at the corner of Vine and Sixth Streets; and that proper openings be made into the same." This Ordinance has been complied with. The expense of constructing it, up to 31st December, is 9,393 dollars, 23 cents.

Tenth. An Ordinance, passed April 7th, directing them "to construct or cause to be constructed, a good and substantial brick Culvert, of a circular form, and of sufficient capacity, (not less than four feet in the clear,) commencing at the Culvert in Walnut Street, and running southward along Fifth Street, 217 feet, with proper openings." This Ordinance has also been complied with. When the Culvert directed by the Ordinance was constructed, all communication with the one that runs diagonally across Fifth Street, under the houses, from the south side of Fifth Street, until it unites with the Walnut Street Culvert, 200 feet south of Fifth Street, was cut off by a brick wall four feet thick, so that all the water, &c. that passes through the Culvert, west of Fifth Street, is conveyed into the Walnut Street Sewer, at Fifth Street.

Eleventh. The Resolution, passed April 7th, directing them to ascertain the condition of the Sewer in Dock Street, and report the result of their examination, together with such opinions as they may form of the practicability and cost of repairing the same. On the 12th May, the Commissioners communicated to Councils the result of their examination; and as important facts were ascertained, (by an unpleasant and rather dangerous excursion through the Sewer, from Third Street to the Drawbridge Dock,) to prevent a similar survey, at least for some time, and that the situation of it may be more generally known, they have thought proper to annex it also to this Report: viz. "The Commissioners have carefully examined the Sewer in Dock Street, from Third Street to the River Delaware; and are of opinion, that such parts of it, as could be seen, are in good condition. There are some circumstances, however, which they think proper to communicate in reference to the Sewer in Dock Street, particularly that part of it north of Walnut Street, and of the Walnut Street Sewer constructed in 1821.

"1. There is in that part of the Dock Street Sewer north of Walnut Street, mud, large stones, rubbish, &c. to the depth of not less than three feet. The bottom of this Sewer is flat, and planked; many of the planks are loose; one was found at the mouth of the Walnut Street Sewer, on the day the survey was made. The condition of that part of the walls on which the arch is turned, that is, under the mud, &c. could not be ascertained by the Commissioners; but from information received from those who made a survey in 1811, they are, no doubt, imper-

fect. Since, however, the construction of the Walnut Street Sewer, and the connection between this and the Fourth Street Sewer has been cut off, by closing it where it crossed at Fourth Street, but little water passes through it. This part of the Sewer is, no doubt, nearly full at every high tide.

"2. The bottom of the Walnut Street Sewer is about three feet below the top of the Dock Street Sewer, north and south of Walnut Street. Common tides flow into the Walnut Street Sewer, about 140 feet west of the west line of Dock Street, and rise about two feet above the bottom at the mouth of said Sewer, where it empties into an arch eighteen feet wide, fifty feet in length, and about three feet higher than the Walnut Street Sewer, to which the Dock Street Sewer is connected north and south of Walnut Street. The Walnut Street Sewer is ten feet in the clear, of a circular form. While passing through the Sewers, the Commissioners discovered a stick projecting from the side of the Walnut Street Sewer, about twenty feet from its mouth, and about fourteen inches from the top, to which was adhering a quantity of straw, &c. that must have floated on the surface of the water. From this circumstance, the Commissioners are of opinion that this Sewer has been nearly full. If this be the fact, the water has been about six feet higher than the top of the Dock Street Sewer.

"3. While passing through the Sewers, at about half tide, a number of openings, of about eighteen inches square, were discovered near the top. The Commissioners, believing that these openings caused the complaints, examined the cellars of some of the houses, particularly in Dock Street between Walnut and Third Streets, and found that the openings extended to the cellars, which were used for conveniences by the occupiers; through which the water from the Sewer would pass whenever it was full, which will be the case in common showers at high tide."

Twelfth. The Resolution, passed April 7th, directing them to cause the following streets and alleys to be regulated, curbed, and paved forthwith—viz.

1. Keys's alley.
2. Coates's alley.
3. Drinker's alley.
4. Elfreth's alley.
5. Coombes's alley.
6. Chancery lane.
7. Second Street, from Dock to Spruce Street.
8. Race Street, from Third to Fourth Street.
9. Fourth Street, from Harmony court to Walnut Street.
10. Comptroller Street, from Spruce to Union Street.
11. Castle Street, from Tenth to Eleventh Street.

All the streets and alleys above enumerated have been paved, excepting Drinker's alley, the repaving of which was suspended by Resolution of Councils, of 28th April. The pavement of said alley was however thoroughly repaired.

Thirteenth. The Resolution, passed April 14th, directing them to cause the following streets, alleys, &c. to be regulated, curbed, and paved, in the order in which they are set down, has been complied with, excepting Lombard Street alley, and Second Street from Pine to Little Dock Street.

1. Twelfth Street, from High to Mulberry Street.
2. Eleventh Street, from Sassafras to Vine Street.
3. Thirteenth Street, from High to Chesnut Street.
4. Lombard Street alley.
5. Middle and Maple alleys.
6. Locust Street, from Eleventh to Twelfth Street.
7. Mark's lane.
8. Pear Street, from Third to Laurel Street. By a Resolution of Councils, passed August 18th, the paving of Pear Street was continued from Laurel to Dock Street.
9. Second Street, from Pine to Little Dock Street.
10. Walnut Street, from Thirteenth to Broad Street.
11. Twelfth Street, from Walnut to Spruce Street.

The paving of Lombard Street alley was dispensed with by a Resolution of Councils, passed June 9th, which also directed the Commissioners "to cause the regulation of Penn Street, at the intersection of Lombard Street alley, to be so altered as to carry off the water along Penn Street to Pine Street, instead of turning it down said alley." The pavement of Lombard Street alley was, however, repaired, so as to contract the passage of the water to the centre of the alley.

By a Resolution of Councils, passed on the 18th August, the Commissioners were directed "to proceed with the paving ordered by Councils, in such rotation as would be best adapted to promote economy in the completion of the work." At this time, paving stones were hauled and deposited on the footways of Walnut Street between Thirteenth and Broad, Perry Street from Spruce to Pine Street, and Twelfth Street from Walnut to Spruce, &c. much to the annoyance of the citizens. The Iron Pipes were not laid in Second Street; the openings into the Sewer were not constructed; and as the paving of Dock Street across Spruce, to the opening in the centre of Dock Street south of Spruce, was necessarily connected with the paving of Second Street, (though not contemplated at that time by Councils,) it was thought, under all the circumstances, most economical to proceed with the paving of the abovementioned streets, and dispense with the paving of Second Street. For the paving of Second Street, see Remarks on appropriations for 1826, under No. 1, *New Paving*.

Fourteenth. The Resolution, passed on the 14th April, directing them "to ascertain and report to Councils the condition of the Sewers in the vicinity of the intersection of Second and Union Streets," was attended to; and on the 11th August, the following was communicated to Councils—viz.

"The Sewer in the immediate vicinity of the intersection of Second and Union Streets, and extending to the opening in the centre of Dock Street south of Spruce, has been thoroughly examined, and found to be in good order, being four and a

half feet in diameter, with a descent sufficient to carry off double the quantity of water which it is necessary to pass into it. This fact being ascertained, a regulation of ascents and descents in Second, Spruce, and Dock Streets, has been agreed to by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and City Regulators." A plan of regulation accompanied the above communication.

Fifteenth. The Resolution, passed April 14th, directed them "to cause Pine Street, from Eighth to Broad Street, to be levelled and filled up, conformably to the existing regulation." This Resolution has been so far complied with as was considered most beneficial to the Corporation. It was not necessary to do any thing between Eighth and Ninth Streets, as a considerable quantity of earth must be removed from that square, if it should be paved. It is not filled up to the established regulation, from Ninth to Thirteenth Street, with the exception of the intersections of Ninth, Tenth, and Twelfth Streets; but to such a height as will, with a little regulating in each square, prepare it for the reception of gravel. This plan was pursued, to prevent the expense of removing the earth, which is generally a considerable item in the expense of paving. From Thirteenth Street, including the intersection, to within about 100 feet east of Broad Street, about the usual quantity of earth must be removed, previous to paving. About 100 feet east of Broad Street, and Broad Street from the south side of Pine Street to within 150 feet of Spruce Street, is also brought to nearly the proper height for receiving gravel. But little earth will have to be removed from that square, to fit it for paving.

Sixteenth. The Resolution of 14th April, directing them "to cause Schuylkill Front Street, from High to Vine Street, to be levelled and filled up, conformably to the existing regulation," has not been complied with. The Appropriation No. 2, to which the expense of completing this work was chargeable, was not sufficient for the necessary repairs of the unpaved streets. The Commissioners were also so much engaged with paving, constructing sewers, &c. that it was impossible for them to attend to it until too late in the season for such work, even had the appropriation been sufficient. For the regulation of Schuylkill Front Street, see remarks on appropriations for 1826—No. 2, *Unpaved Streets*.

Seventeenth. The Resolution of April 14th, directing them "to have a room made over the Mayor's private office, for the reception of stolen goods, or other articles which may be detained by order of the Mayor," has been complied with.

Eighteenth. The Resolution of April 28th, directing them "to have the eastern ends of Walnut and Spruce Streets paved up to the wharf logs, and that the course of the south gutter near Walnut Street wharf, be so altered, that the water thereof will run into the river at the openings made for venting the water of the north gutter thereof." This Resolution has been complied with, as it relates to the end of Walnut Street. For paving at Spruce Street wharf, see Resolution passed on the 9th June, 22d item.

Nineteenth. The Resolution of May 19th, directing them "to employ suitable persons to wash the gutters of the streets, lanes, and alleys of the City, during the warm and dry weather, as often as the same may be expedient," &c. was also attended to.

Twentieth. The Resolution of May 19th, directing them “to proceed to raise the south-west Public Square (Rittenhouse Square) to its proper level, so soon as proper earth or other materials can be had on reasonable terms, and that they advise on this subject with the Committee of Councils; and also that they cause the fence round the Square to be repaired, and to be kept in such repairs as to prevent intrusion thereon.” This Resolution has been but partially complied with, as it respects raising the Square to its proper level. The distance between the Square and where the paving was done during the past year, was too great to have the surplus earth removed to it, without considerable expense. Some hundred loads of earth were however procured from the neighbourhood, and deposited on it, at a trifling expense. As the paving and improvements progress westward, a place of deposit for the surplus earth will be sought for, when it can be brought to its level with little or no expense. That part of the Resolution which required them to cause the fence to be repaired, &c. has been attended to. The whole of the old fence, on the north front (on Walnut Street) could not be repaired to advantage; and the Committee of Councils, on that Square, directed its removal, and the erection of a new one, which was accordingly put up, and the expense charged to No. 14.

Twenty-first. The Resolution, passed on the 9th June, directing them “to cause Perry Street from Spruce to Pine Street, and Lyndall’s alley from Twelfth to Dean Street, to be regulated, curbed, and paved,” has been complied with.

Twenty-second. The Resolution, passed on the 9th June, directing them “to cause Spruce Street to the wharf to be regulated, curbed, and paved,” has also been complied with. Previous to paving, a small Culvert, of a circular form, two and a half feet in the clear, was constructed, commencing on the south side of Spruce, about twenty feet west of the wharf, and running diagonally across Spruce Street to the north corner of the wharf, where a trap is constructed for the reception of the filth, &c.

Twenty-third. The Resolution of June 28th, directing them “to have the north side of Pine Street from Third to Fourth Street, and the west side of Third Street from Pine to Union Street, regulated and curbed, and the gutters constructed so as to carry off the water that passes through the small sewer running diagonally from Pine to Union Street, near Third Street.” This work has been completed, and the object accomplished that was intended, to the great advantage of the neighbourhood. A similar improvement on the south side of Pine Street would be desirable, so that the other opening into the sewer might also be closed.

Twenty-fourth. The Resolution, passed on the 20th July, directing them “to cause Chesnut Street, east of Front Street, to be regulated, curbed, and paved, according to the plan submitted by the City Regulators for the improvement of Chesnut Street, by raising it, from the east side of Water Street to the line of the curbstone on the wharf.” This Resolution has been complied with.

Twenty-fifth. The Resolution, passed on the 11th August, authorizing them “to sign the agreement with James Lefevre, for the lease of Chesnut Street Wharf,

“agreeably to their proposals, including the right to use the north dock for the Newcastle Packets, and to land and take in goods, provided the same shall not interfere with the passage of carriages on any part of said wharf.”

This Resolution has also been complied with, and the necessary security taken for the fulfilment of said contract, as in other cases.

Twenty-sixth. The Resolution, passed 25th November, directing them “to have a new roof put upon the Old Court House, corner of Second and High Streets; the cornice round the eaves, repaired; the walls cleansed, oiled, and pencilled; such alterations made in the arrangement of the rooms, as may be found necessary for the better accommodation of the City Watch; and such other repairs put upon the building, as shall be directed by a Committee of Councils, to be appointed for that purpose.”

The improvements contemplated by this Resolution, were principally superintended by the Committee of Councils, who entered into contract with Mr. John Haviland, to make the improvements on the outer part of the building, the arrangements in the interior, above, and including the first floor, for the sum of 1,286 dollars, 38 cents. Other improvements, not enumerated in the contract, were directed by the Committee, including a new ceiling under the first floor, and warming the house; which increased the expenditure to 1,570 dollars, 40 cents, which was charged to No. 14.

No. 1. *New Paving.* For this appropriation, an estimate cannot be made, until it is ascertained what streets, &c. are to be paved. Seventeen thousand six hundred dollars were appropriated for 1825; and seventeen thousand six hundred and thirty-six dollars, twenty-eight cents, were expended. The number of yards paved, as near as can be ascertained, chargeable to this appropriation, was 22,678. Each team load of gravel, delivered, cost one dollar. The Commissioners anticipate a reduction in the price of gravel, for the present year.

They particularly recommend, that in all cases where Councils conclude to repave streets, directions should be given to repave them first; for in most cases, the greatest proportion of the stone will do to use again, and but few will have to be hauled from the lots where the stone are deposited, which will considerably lessen the expense of paving. By the time the repaving is finished, paving stone will be brought to the City; and instead of having them hauled to the lots, and again from the lots to where they would be wanted for new work, they could be conveyed directly to the streets to be paved. Early orders, however, for repaving and paving, are of considerable importance.

They also respectfully recommend the repaving of—

First. Second Street, from Pine to Spruce.

Second. Little Dock Street, from Second Street, across Spruce Street, to the opening in the centre of Dock Street, north of Spruce, and nearly opposite the late residence of Mr. Levi Hollingsworth, deceased, where it will unite with the new paving.

If those streets are repaved, it will be necessary to construct two Stench-Traps or openings into the Sewer in Second Street, about 140 feet south of Spruce Street. It will be also necessary to construct a Stench-Trap, and small Sewer, in Dock Street, to commence about twenty feet north of the late residence of Mr. L. Hollingsworth, deceased, to run diagonally across Dock Street, until it unites with the Dock Street Sewer.

Third. Fifth Street, from Walnut Street to the African Church.

Fourth. Vine Street, from Sixth to Tenth Street.

They also respectfully recommend the paving of the following streets and alleys:—

1. Twelfth Street, from High to Walnut Street.
2. Twelfth Street, from Spruce to Pine.
3. A twenty feet street, running from Twelfth to Thirteenth Street, below Spruce, and two others running south from it, east and west of Perry Street. The Iron Pipes are laid in these streets, from which sixteen houses are supplied with Schuylkill water.
4. Twelfth Street, from Mulberry to Sassafras.
5. Cherry Street, from Eleventh to Twelfth.
6. A twenty feet street, running from Twelfth to Thirteenth Street, between High and Filbert Streets.
7. Locust Street, from Twelfth to Thirteenth.

8. Dean Street (twenty feet street) from Spruce to Walnut, between Twelfth and Thirteenth Streets.
9. Centre Street (twenty feet street) from Twelfth to Thirteenth Street, between Locust and Walnut.
10. Clover Street (twenty feet street) from Twelfth to Thirteenth Street, between High and Chesnut.
11. Mercer Street from Locust to Warren Street, and Warren Street from Twelfth to Quince Street. Both of these streets are twenty feet in width, and run about half through the square.
12. Pine Street, from Eighth to Broad.
13. Tenth Street, from Pine to Lombard.
14. George Street, from Thirteenth to Juniper.
15. North Street, from Tenth to Eleventh, between Sassafras and Vine.
16. Shields's alley (twenty by seventy feet) between Raspberry and Currant alleys.
17. Raspberry alley (twenty feet in width) from Walnut to Locust, between Ninth and Tenth Streets.

No. 2. Unpaved Streets. Seventeen hundred dollars were appropriated for 1825. This sum was not sufficient for the necessary repairs; consequently, several streets were not attended to.

The Commissioners have procured from the City Regulator a profile of Schuylkill Front Street, from Vine to Cedar Street; which shows the quantity of earth to be removed from some places, and what is wanted in others, to bring it to the established regulation. The surplus earth to be removed from Front Street, could be deposited on the north side of the Permanent Bridge; so as to bring the street that runs from the end of the pavement, along the north wall of the Bridge, to the River Schuylkill, to its proper height and width. This street is now but nineteen feet in width. The Commissioners would recommend, that so much of the public lot should be thrown out, as to make it forty feet in width. It is indispensably necessary to fill up this street, before the lot adjoining it can be made any use of; as all the water that passes over the surface of High Street, from Schuylkill Third Street, passes thence through the Sewer that runs diagonally across High Street from Ashton Street, and thence over the surface of the lot. To obviate this, a Sewer must be constructed along the centre of this street, from the present Sewer to the River Schuylkill. This street ought to be filled up at least one year, before it will be settled sufficiently to build the Sewer on.

An appropriation of two thousand five hundred dollars will be required for the necessary repairs of unpaved streets.

No. 3. Cleansing the City. Two thousand five hundred dollars will be required for the contractors. It frequently happens, that nuisances are to be removed from the unpaved parts of the City, that do not come under the contract for cleansing. They would suggest the propriety of appropriating fifty dollars, to meet the expenses that may occur. Twenty-five hundred and fifty dollars will be sufficient.

No. 4. *Docks and Sewers.* Three thousand dollars will be required for cleansing docks, constructing and repairing stench-traps, &c.

No. 5. *Lighting and Watching.* Thirty-eight thousand five hundred dollars were appropriated for 1825; and thirty-eight thousand four hundred and fifty-eight dollars were expended. On the 31st December, 1824, the Commissioners had in store 4,709 gallons of oil; on the 31st December, 1825, they had on hand 4,985 gallons. In 1825, they purchased about 15,000 gallons. Sixteen thousand gallons will be wanted for the present year.

The City Watch, on the 31st December, 1825, consisted of sixteen silent watch, forty-seven lamp-lighters, twenty-five east and west watch, four market watch, one at the City Hall, one in the State-House Yard, one at the Drawbridge landing, and two turnkeys—making ninety-seven. The average monthly wages, including lighting lamps, (after deducting fines,) amounts to 2,200 dollars; making 26,400 dollars annual wages.

The number of lamps, on the 31st December, 1824, was 1,604; on the 31st December, 1825, there were 1,662—increase during the last year, 58.

Judging from all the information that can be obtained, as to the probable price of oil, it is believed that an appropriation of thirty-seven thousand five hundred dollars will be sufficient for the present year.

It may not be improper to annex the following extract from the Report of last year, to show what the present plan for watching the City requires—viz.

“That each watchman shall go in a direct line for four squares; to turn no corners, except into alleys that lead from the street that may be allotted to him; and to travel over the same ground twice in each hour, when practicable—viz. A watchman will start, say from the wharf on Mulberry street, and pass up Mulberry street, on the north side, to Fourth, and return, on the south side, to the wharf, visiting each alley, as he goes and returns; and so on, from Fourth to Eighth, and from Eighth to Twelfth, &c. &c. &c. Watchmen also pass along Water, Front, Second, Third, &c. leaving Vine street, and go to about High street, and return; and from thence southward, in about the same proportion that they progress westward; so that, while the watchmen are passing along Vine, Sassafras, Mulberry, &c. others are crossing them at Water, Front, Second, Third, Fourth, &c.”

No. 6. *Pumps and Wells.* Two thousand five hundred dollars were appropriated for 1825; and two thousand six hundred and thirty-three dollars were expended. It is believed that an appropriation of two thousand five hundred dollars will be sufficient for the year 1826. There is no appropriation made by Councils, in which the citizens of the western part of the City have a greater interest, than in the appropriation for Pumps and Wells.

It may not be improper to add, also, from the Report of last year, that

“In making the expenditure for pumps and wells, the Commissioners have avoided as much as possible repairing pumps in the eastern part of the City, or where there is a plentiful supply of hydrant water. They have removed, within the last year, a number of pumps from the eastern part of the City, and arched over

the wells; and, though the removal of them was attended with expense, it was considered most advantageous, and was generally done with the consent of the citizens in the different neighbourhoods from which they were removed; but in most cases, there were more than one in a square. While it has been considered necessary to reduce the number of pumps in the eastern part of the City, their increase has been found necessary in the western part; for, as the improvements and population increase, the want of water necessarily increases; and, in case of fire, where there is no hydrant water, the pumps have proved of great advantage."

No. 7. *Regulating Ascents and Descents.* Eight hundred dollars were appropriated for 1825, and eight hundred and twenty-nine dollars were expended. An appropriation of seven hundred and fifty dollars will be sufficient for 1826.

No. 9. *For Fuel, and other Expenses of the Offices in the City Hall.* An appropriation of six hundred dollars will answer for 1826.

No. 10. *Menial Services in the Markets.* An appropriation of five hundred and fifty dollars will be required.

No. 13. *For repaving over Water Pipes, and repairing Old Pavements.* Five thousand four hundred dollars were appropriated, and five thousand four hundred and sixty-six dollars were expended, in 1825. An estimate cannot be made for this appropriation, as the amount will depend on the quantity of Iron Pipe that may be laid down. In 1824, seven thousand dollars were expended. An appropriation of four thousand five hundred dollars, it is believed, will be sufficient.

No. 14. *For Repairing and Improving City Property.* Four thousand six hundred and fifty dollars were appropriated for 1825, and four thousand nine hundred and thirty dollars expended. The expense of improving the City Hall, and Old Court House, corner of Second and High Streets, were charged to this appropriation. For the current expenses of the year 1826, an appropriation of twenty-five hundred dollars will be sufficient.

No. 19. *For the Purchase of Paving Stone for 1827.* Two thousand five hundred dollars were appropriated for 1826. The Commissioners recommend an appropriation of the same amount for 1827.

No. 20. *Repairing Footways, in Cases of Default by Individuals.* An appropriation of fifty dollars will be sufficient.

REMARKS.

THE Commissioners think it proper to make the following Remarks (some of which were annexed to the Statement of their Accounts in 1825) for the consideration of Councils:—

1. The contract for Cleansing the City, will terminate on the 14th April, 1827.
2. The roof of the Market House in High Street between Third and Fourth Streets, (particularly the north side of it,) is in bad condition. The western moiety of this House, however, is appropriated by an Act of Assembly for the use of country people (free of rent) bringing the produce of their farms to market; but it is exclusively occupied by hucksters from Germantown and other parts of the

County, not excepting the Liberties of the City. The Commissioners suggest the propriety of Councils applying to the Legislature for the passage of a law, to authorize the Corporation to place it under the same regulations as the western moieties are, of the Market Houses west of Fourth Street.

3. The brick pavements under the Market Houses between Second and Fourth Streets, are in such bad condition, owing to the bricks being worn, that a person is almost constantly engaged repairing them; about two hundred and fifty dollars are expended annually. The Commissioners respectfully recommend the repaving of them.

4. The Market Houses in Second Street between Pine and Cedar Streets, particularly the roofs, want repairing. Many of the pillars that support the projections on each side of the Market Houses, also require bands at the bottoms. The preservation of the projections, and the safety of the citizens, require that they should be repaired, as soon as convenient. The Commissioners suggest the propriety of a Committee of Councils being appointed to view them.

5. The leases of the Lot on Delaware Front and Spruce Streets, terminated on the first day of August last; of which Councils were informed, by special communication. They are occupied by Messrs. Cropper & Lonton, Graves, and Wood, who wish a renewal of their leases.

6. A continuation of the Sewer in Dock Street, from its termination under the Old Fish House (so called) to the end of the wharf, would not only be a great public advantage, but a desirable public improvement. The Dock on the south side of the principal wharf is now unnecessarily wide, and if contracted to a width so as to admit but two shallops, the wharf on the south side might be made much wider, of which the Sewer would form a part, and thus the space for landing wood would be considerably increased. The construction of a Sewer, as proposed, would also prevent an annual expenditure of from seven to eight hundred dollars.

7. The construction of a Stench-Trap at the south-east corner of Walnut and Ninth Streets, will be of considerable advantage to that neighbourhood.

The foregoing Remarks, &c. are respectfully submitted to the consideration of Councils.
