REPORT

of the

WATERING COMMITTER.

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THE Watering Committee present their Annual Report to the Select and Common Councils.

During the past year some progress has been made in the enlargement of the wood-yard, but from the confined situation of the quarry, the advancement in the work is necessarily tedious.

The coping of the wall round the Reservoir has not been done, but it will probably be completed during the next summer.

After a full trial of the Engine constructed by Oliver Evans, it has been found to perform equal to his contract, and the Committee have therefore accepted it, and have paid him the balance of his account. The Old Engine remains on hand, although no means have been left untried for its disposal.

The past year has added new proof to the experience of the Committee, of the perishing condition of the Wooden Logs, which will all require to be renewed in the course of a very few years; and although the cost in the first instance will be greater, yet the Committee are inclined to believe the ultimate saving will be very considerable by the substitution of Iron Pipes, and much pains have been

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taken to procure the best information as to their construction. A trial has been made of four hundred feet, which appears to answer well.

Not only is it necessary to ascertain the best mode of constructing and laying the pipes, and of the stop cocks, &c.; but it is also important to pursue a system in laying the pipes of a size adequate to supply the City at a future period, when a much larger quantity of water will be required than at the present moment.

It is understood that after many years experience (from having commenced with an improper system) it has been found necessary by the New River Water Works, in London, to relay their pipes at an expense which has reduced the value of their Stock, from thirteen thousand to six thousand pounds sterling, per share.

The extent of Pipes laid in this City already exceeds thirty-two miles, independent of the Mains leading from the Reservoir.

Models of pipes, &c. have been ordered from England, and the necessary information has been written for; but the Committee are so well satisfied that the information derived by a correspondence for years, cannot equal the personal observation of a practical man in the course of a few weeks, that they propose to send the present Superintendant to London early in the spring, to obtain on the spot the best knowledge of the subject.

A lot has been purchased on Cherry street, between Ninth and Tenth Streets, which has been paid for, and the amount is charged in the accounts now submitted. The erection of the necessary buildings for work shops is contemplated to be done during the ensuing summer.

The ground belonging to the City at Fair Mount, has been inclosed with a post and rail fence.

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The annexed account No. 1, exhibits the disbursements since. last report, for completing and carrying on the Water Works, amounting to fifty-one thousand three hundred and eighty-nine dollars, twenty-six cents.

No. 2, exhibits the amount paid into the Treasury during the last year by the Superintendant for materials sold.

No. 3, shows the quantity of pipe, laid during last year, with the quantity remaining on hand.

No. 4, contains the estimate for completing the Fair Mount Water Works, and for carrying on the same, during the current year, amounting to, \$45,125 00

Towards which there remains an authority to borrow 2000 dollars, being the residue of the loan of 30,000 dollars, authorized by ordinance, of which 13,000 dollars remained at the date of the last report, and 11,000 dollars has since been borrowed, leaving,

No. 6 exhibits the number of dwellings, &c. supplied, by which it appears that 3254 houses and manufactories, 174 stalls for horses, and 256 private baths are supplied with Schuylkill water.
