OF THE

Watering Committee, &c.

THE Joint Committee of the Select and Common Councils, appointed to the superintendance of the Water Works—

REPORT—

THAT having investigated the accounts and operation of this department of the Public Works through the last season, they are enabled to lay before Councils such a statement of the business as it has been usual to present at this season of the year. The accounts and statement for each year have heretofore been made up to the first of November; and your Committee have thought it proper to present a view of the Works during a similar period, viz. from the first of November 1803 to the first of November 1804. In this instance it is rendered less difficult, perhaps, than heretofore, as almost all the Committee for the last are continued on that for the ensuing year. It has been usual in former Reports to recapitulate the whole of the expences and proceedings from the commencement of the Works; but as all those papers and reports are already in the possession of the Councils, and have been acted on, it has been conceived unnecessary on the present occasion to go over the same ground. The present Report, therefore, will only contain an account of the proceedings during the aforesaid period.

The Coping of the Bason and Canal Walls have been compleated, and a strong board fence erected, enclosing the Bason and Canal, in order to prevent cattle, dogs, &c. from having access to the water contained therein.

Centre-Square Engine House.—A little pointing, plaistering and painting have been done to the roof of this building;—the old boiler has been removed, and the foundation laid for the reception of a new one of cast iron, which is now in hand:—about one half of the castings are ready, and the remainder can be had as soon as the workmen will be ready to attend to the fitting it up. This boiler was to have been speedily finished after the determination of the Committee to have it erected; but as the forges and time of the smiths have been entirely employed in preparing stop-cocks, fire-plugs, iron pipe, and other work now progressing in the streets, it was therefore thought best to postpone the erection of the boiler until the workmen should be less employed at the distribution; as much expence would have been incurred by providing forges and tools merely for this purpose.

By the Report of last year Councils were informed of the failure, by want of freshes, in the delivery of the thirty thousand feet of timber engaged for the work of that season: such part of it however as was prevented from being then delivered, viz. about twen-

ty-four thousand feet, has since been received by your Committee, having been brought to the log pond at Kensington so early as the latter end of December and the beginning of January last. Taught by the circumstances of this failure, and convinced of the advantages both in point of economy and quickness of supply, of having the timber for pipe prepared in sufficient quantity, your Committee have thought it prudent, in order to prevent a similar disappointment, to enter early into a contract for a further supply: they therefore advertised for proposals for the delivery of twenty-six thousand feet of yellow pine timber—and Messrs. John Grimes and George Davis having offered to deliver it on the best terms, a contract was concluded with them for the above-mentioned quantity, the delivery of which they have happily been able to complete by the last of May.

The residue of the timber bought from Edmund Brewer, as mentioned in last year's report, has been received—and an opportunity offering of making a purchase of some excellent timber at a reduced price, the Committee concluded to embrace the same; and one thousand three hundred and sixty feet was purchased from Benjamin Love.

A further contract has been entered into with Mr. Caleb Leach, for boring fifty thousand feet of pipe, as might be directed by the Committee—wherein he was bound to bore twenty-five thousand feet during the season of 1804, and twenty-five thousand feet during the season of 1805: he has bored of the above quantity to the present time upwards of thirty thousand feet; and if the season continues favourable will go on to bore some time longer.

The contract for digging the Pipe-trench has been continued with James Cochran, on the same terms as those of last year.

The inhabitants of Water-street being extremely desirous of having the pipe laid there, some pains have been taken to accommodate them. This street would perhaps have been earlier supplied, if it had not been found that the increased pressure of the water in that low situation was more than there was reason to believe the wooden pipes could bear—those laid in several streets down to the intersection of Water-street, having in almost every instance given way: It was therefore necessary to devise a mode of supplying that part of the city with stronger pipe. An experiment had been made some time since, near the Centre-square Engine House, to ascertain the best and cheapest mode of supply by iron pipe—an entirely new method of jointing them was there tried, and found to be more effectual and less expensive than any heretofore known to have been in use;—in consequence it was determined to lay such in Water-street. A contract has been accordingly made with Robeson and Pauls, to furnish a quantity of three inch cast iron pipe, sufficient to supply as much of Water-street as the Committee should direct; under which there has been delivered fifty-six tons, which have been laid in Water-street from Vine-street to the Drawbridge, and also in some other situations; and from the appearance and goodness of this part of the work, your Committee are of opinion it will answer the purpose extremely well; and the difficulties and expence, with the interruption of business, which were likely to have taken place, by leakage or bursting, if wooden pipes had been laid in such a low situation, are, by the above measure, avoided.

The quantity of pipe which has been laid in various parts of the city this season, is about thirty-two thousand five hundred and fifty feet, of which twenty-eight thousand five hundred and seventy-two feet is of wood, and three thousand nine hundred and seventy-eight feet iron, exclusive of nineteen hundred feet used in repairs.

There have been fixed for public supply forty-two pumps and cisterns, and forty-four fire-plugs, for the purpose of cleansing the streets, washing the gutters, and for a supply in case of fire. A number both of pumps and fire-plugs are now preparing to be fixed in their situations this fall.

Your Committee have not yet been able to make a settlement of the accounts and concerns with Nicholas J. Roosevelt, although no pains have been spared, nor any measures left undone, which in their opinion would tend to so desirable an object; but hope in a very short time to come to some conclusion, or to lay before Councils such a statement of the business as will enable them to act in a manner the most conducive to the public interests.

In order to exhibit a view of the expences incurred, and monies drawn during the aforesaid period, your Committee accompany this Report with sundry documents or accounts—viz.

- NO. 1. Being an account of Certificates on which orders have been drawn on the Treasury, shewing every object and purpose for which the money was required—the total amount of which is - - - - - \$ 34,213 06
- NO. 2. Exhibits the amount in gross with which each particular head or department of the work was chargeable of the above amount.
- NO. 3. Contains an account of all the expences incurred, including both that which is paid and what remains due; also the advances on account of Nicholas J. Roosevelt.
- NO. 4. Is a list of debts owing.
- NO. 5. Contains an account of the houses and manufactories supplied with the water, with the amount of annual rent, and what will be due on the first of July, 1805.
