OF THE

WATERING COMMITTEE,

APPOINTED TO SUPERINTEND

THE WATER WORKS.

SINCE the Annual Report of the 6th of November 1807, the southern boiler, the new roofing with slate, of the western engine house, the boring mill, pond, and the brick arch over part of the tunnel, leading from the bason on Schuylkill, to the well of the lower engine, have been completed. The new fly wheel, and reservoirs at centre engine, have also been fixed. From the effects produced by the new fly wheel, the engine, pumps, beams, and every other connection are rendered more steady. The expectation of your Committee, is exceeded in this improvement, as a considerable gain in its evolution, has taken place, and will produce a saving in the consumption of fuel. Whilst these heavy works were progress. ing, all the valves, and connections of both engines, have been carefully examined, and put in the best state of repair. Two new brass exhausting valves have also been put in; the hot water cistern, and feeding pump were rotten, and replaced with new ones. The timbers supporting the fly wheel, as reported last year, to be insufficient in strength, were also rotten, one of the new frames has been fixed, the other next the wooden boiler which is ready could not be put in. The old one has however been secured for the present, and until the boiler, the timbers of which are much decayed, is removed, will answer with the additional braces put to it. Your Committee recommend the removal of the boiler, to the north west apartment of the engine house. It being placed in that room, would afford more space, in the engine house for repairs, and at the same time procure a circulation of air, so necessary for the preservation of the timbers, on which the works are supported .- The plank required for the wooden boiler should be provided this season, and should any part of the iron prove defective, new plates ought to be provided before hand.

The expence of making the log pond on Schuylkill, and keeping it in any tolerable repair, is greater than was expected, the quality of the mud, on the east bank of the river is not fit for the purposes of banking, and unless the pond is surrounded with timber, early in the ensuing spring, it will be impossible to secure the logs and pipes in it. The building of a capacious vault for the keeping of the coal for the centre engine, cannot be delayed. The proprietors of the ground south and west of the present coal inclosure complain of it, and independent of their interest, it is proper that a more suitable and safe place be prepared, the disadvantage of the open air, and the rains operating on the strength and quality of the coal, and their liability to be stolen, requires it should be under cover; the proposed place for a vault is under the western avenue, leading from the engine house, connecting the same with the cellar, and making it 60 feet long, by 60 feet wide. 2164 feet of pipe have been laid in the further distribution and repairs, this year.

4000 feet of logs should be contracted for this season, as the stock in the pond, is not more than 500 feet of 4 1-2, and 500 of 3 inch pipe, which is insufficient for any exigency which may occur during the next year. The wooden frames over the stop cocks in the streets are frequently to be renewed, besides the expence attending them, the paving cannot be secured effectually, and the repaving is thereby considerably increased. It is advisable to substitute cast iron ones which will be durable; for a trial your Committee have caused a few to be cast, the cost of which amounts to \$11 75 cents each, including the covers; they have also provided some iron pump chambers which have been found to answer the desired purpose, in the saving of repairs to the pump boxes and materials, the expence including the boring, stands at \$4 50 cents each.

The Ordinance passed the 7th May, 1801, vesting the superintendance of the Water Works, in commissioners therein named, has never been repealed, the watering committee having ever since that session, acted under annual resolutions of councils, they therefore suggest the propriety of an Ordinance repealing the one above named, and granting to them the necessary powers for conducting the Water Works, collecting the rents &c. and making other suitable regulations for the distribution of the water, as many defects exist under former Ordinances.

Since the purchase of Nicholas J. Roosevelt's lease of the Works on Schuylkill, the duties of the superintendant have more than doubled, without receiving any extra compensation. Considering his talents and his attention to the interest of the city in his department, and that his predecessor obtained from the watering committee \$1300 yearly, for managing centre square engine only. Your Committee have judged it proper to increase his salary from the first of October last, from \$1000 to \$1200 per annum, and the keeping of his horse.—

Both these sums have been paid into the city treasury at every quarter, as per receipt of G. A. Baker, treasurer, annexed to the quarterly list rendered by the secretary, to your committee.

The number of houses, public institutions, manufactories, &c. supplied with Schuylkill water, amount to 1,284, of which 155 remain on water rights, which will expire on the 1st of July, 1809.

Duplicates of water rents have been delivered to the collectors of the taxes in September last, the aggregate, including arrearages of rent due by sundries, amount to \$6,207 1. From this is to be deducted the sum of \$34 16, amount of eight persons who have already relinquished the use of the water since the duplicates have been issued, which proves the necessity of making provision for the contract, to be binding for one year, and the payment made in advance, as any person has it in his power, either through vexation, or other cause, to decline the use of the water at any time, and occasion trouble to the committee, and collectors, and proves detrimental to the rent.
