**REPORT**  
**OF THE**  
**WATERING COMMITTEE,**  
**APPOINTED TO SUPERINTEND**  
**THE WATER WORKS.**

---

THAT since the last annual report of November 5, 1810, the coal vault, the log pond and the fence on the southern half of the centre circle have been completed.

A contract for 8000 feet of timber was entered into during the fall of last year; the logs have been since delivered: 5015 feet of them have been used in replacing decayed pipes, and in extending the distribution of the water as per statement, No. 2. For the ensuing year your Committee consider that an additional quantity of 7000 of timber will be necessary.

In obedience to the Ordinance passed on the second day of August last, granting aid to the Fire Hose and Engine Companies in the city, your Committee have distributed in the following manner the \$1500 thereby appropriated, viz.

To eight Hose companies, - - - - -	\$100	\$800

Previous to the foregoing distribution being made, the Fire Hose and Engine Companies were required, by advertisement, in the public papers, to exhibit their several statements to the Watering Committee, on or before the 15th of September last, and on that day, by a resolution of the Committee, the Mayor of the city was requested to issue his warrants on the treasurer in favour of the presidents of the companies respectively, according to the above allotment.

On the first day of August last, your Committee made report to Councils of the state of the appropriation for carrying on the water works to the 31st of December, 1811, which report was referred to the Committee of ways and means, and remains, as far as your Committee can learn, unregarded by them. Your Committee regret that they are obliged again to call the attention of Councils to this subject, which deserved, and ought long since, to have received

consideration; and they take the liberty of expressing a hope that Councils will not permit them to be placed in a situation which would compel either a disobedience of the positive provisions of an ordinance which directs that money shall not be drawn from the treasury upon an exhausted appropriation, or an entire stoppage of the works. The deficiency, as appears by the annexed estimate, will amount to \$4199 39, which sum your Committee earnestly request may be immediately provided for.

Up to the 30th September, 1811, 2127 dwellings, manufactories and institutions were supplied with Schuylkill water, as per statement, No. 4, annexed.
