ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

WATERING COMMITTEE.

IN the accompanying Report, the Watering Committee having made a full statement of their proceedings in the works at Fair Mount, and in laying the iron pipes, it only remains further to communicate the account of their fiscal concerns for the past year, with their prospect for the present.

The Committee refer to the annexed documents, as part of their report, in which will be found the particulars of the expenditures for the year 1822, from which, and from the report last year, it appears, That the sum estimated to carry on the works of the Steam Engines, the Distribution, Salaries, &c. was - - - - - 21694 05 And that the sum expended on this head, per account No. 1, amounts to - - - - - 25588 73

Showing a deficiency of - - - - - \$ 3894 68

Which will be easily accounted for, when it is known that the steam engines were not finally stopped until the 24th of October last, and that it had been calculated they would not be wanted longer than the 1st of July ;—and also, that there are on hand five hundred cords of wood, the cost of which is included in the above mentioned expenditure, which the Committee deemed it prudent to lay up, to guard against any unforeseen event in the operation of the water wheels in the winter. The Committee believe this to have been an excess of caution, and that the wood will be to be sold in the spring. By the Ordinance of 9th May, and the supplement thereto of 24th October, authorizing a loan for iron pipes, the sum of 25000 dollars was raised at an interest of 6 per cent. with a premium of 4 per cent., and 25000 dollars was raised at an interest of 6 per cent. with a premium of \$ 7 01 per cent., and there was accordingly placed to the order of the Committee - - - - - 50000 00 Of which there has been expended, per account No. 1, - - - - - 33287 08

Which arose from various causes, amongst which were the great ice freshet of 21st February, 1822, which pointed out some essential things to be done for the security of the dam, not within the contract of Mr. Cooley; another material circumstance was that of the necessity of building a wall in the new reservoir, and laying the bottom with mortar and bricks to make it tight, which was not originally contemplated, as it was universally believed that it might be made so with clay and puddling; a further cause is to be found in the rise of wages of the millwrights and other workmen, and the much greater length of time required to complete the mills, and work generally, than was anticipated.

To which is to be added such sum as may probably meet the demands of the present year for damages claimed to be done by the erection of Fair Mount dam, the amount of which it is impossible for the Committee to state:—they recommend that an ordinance be passed (and which they offer herewith) to authorize raising the sum of 25000 dollars, to cover the foregoing deficiency, and to meet such claims as may be settled, and which will, of course, only be raised from time to time as may be found needful.

Amongst the accounts herewith will be found the following, which show,

No. 3. The quantity of iron and wooden pipes laid in 1822, and the quantity of the latter on hand.

No. 7. The number of dwellings, manufactories, &c. now supplied with Schuylkill water.

No. 8. The amount of duplicates of water rents for 1823, showing an increase since the last report, of 1008 dollars.

By the account No. 8, it will be seen that the amount of the water rents is \$ 25485 50; that they are progressing; and that, as was anticipated by the Committee in former communications, the rents are not only competent to support the works, and current expenses, but that they are also enabled to come in aid of the general funds; for it appears that the surplus beyond the expenses of the works for this year, amounts to \$ 14819 09, thereby reducing the tax by so much, or in other words, rendering unnecessary a resort to a loan for that sum; at the same time that the city may receive more than double the quantity of water it has ever enjoyed.

On this happy state of things, the Committee most sincerely congratulate Councils; and, with their best wishes for the prosperity of our constituents, whose comfort and happiness are the paramount aim of the Members of Councils, they respectfully submit this annual statement.
