## WATERING COMMITTEE.

To the Select and Common Councils of the City of Philadelphia-

THE Watering Committee respectfully present herewith, detailed statements of the accounts, for the year 1835, of the works under their care, together with an estimate for the year 1836. The estimate for 1835, as per printed report, amounts to forty-four thousand dollars, after which Councils appropriated a further sum of thirty thousand dollars, for the extension of the iron pipes, and for proceeding with the second and third sections of Reservoir No. 4., as far as the season would permit.

which is reserved for the payment of the amount which will fall due in January, as per contract, for the delivery of clay now hauling into the reservoir.

The Committee flatter themselves that their expenditures have been judiciously applied, and the work done was actually necessary to ensure a constant supply of water, and a gradual addition to the ornamental parts of the works, so as to make them not only important for their utility, but to hold their rank as a master work in hydraulics.

The 1st section of reservoir No. 4, was completed and filled with water on the 4th of November last; the 2nd section has been so far forwarded, that it will be paved and fit for use in August next, and it is expected that in October the 3rd section will be in readiness to receive the water, which is all that will be required to complete this department, except the external embankment, and such ornaments and improvements as may hereafter be suggested.

The reservoirs are each twelve feet three inches deep, and the whole covers an area of six acres with water, when full. The mildness of the last season occasioned a less consumption of water, during the summer months, than in 1834—it did not exceed four million gallons per twenty-four hours—the daily consumption during October and November last did not average more than 3,364,625 gallons, and on the 13th of December, during the cold weather, the consumption was only 2,523,236. The water tenants, since December, 1834, have increased in the City and Districts, to 15,704, to which add 3000 families supplied from public hydrant pumps in the City, are equal, together, to 18,704 tenants supplied, who consume, on the average, about 187 gallons each per twenty-four hours.

The appropriation of the last year for the completion of the Fountain and the head pier of the Dam, has been applied to erect a portico to the saloon building—to build a new wall two hundred and fourteen feet long on the mound dam, and to curb and pave the same: the above improvements, together with the replacing of railings, the erection of new ones, and other additions, having been deemed more important than the fountain, it is hoped this change in the appropriation will be approved.

Last year it was judged by the Committee that but few iron pipes would be required in 1835, but after the estimate had been closed, applications were made for a supply of water from Chestnut street to the new improvements extending to Cedar and Schuylkill Second street—to the Gas Works, and to other sections of the City, chiefly west of Broad street. Although the expenses of this department have been considerable, the Committee could not refuse granting so essential a necessary of health to those citizens who have so long contributed to the water department without heretofore enjoying its comforts, or profiting by its aid for protecting their properties from conflagration. The quantity of pipes laid, varying in size from three to twelve inches diameter, exceeds upwards of three and a half miles, which, added to the pipes formerly laid in the City, amounts to fifty-four and three-fourths miles, to which if we add the pipes laid in the Districts, makes the total of all water pipes laid up to December 31, 1835, ninety-three miles.

It was the intention of the Watering Committee, in compliance with the resolution of Councils passed in September, 1828, to have caused a survey to be made of the state of the Fair Mount Dam, but this, during the summer months, was impracticable, on account of the un-

usual quantity of water flowing in the Schuylkill. They therefore instructed Mr. Graff to have such survey made as the state of the water would permit; for that purpose the sheeting of the dam was bored through at regular distances across the river, and it was found that all the stone work and other parts remained as placed when the dam was repaired in 1831.

On the 27th of April last, the Commissioners of the District of Kensington made the first attachment with the pipes of the Northern Liberties, on the Germantown road, above Maiden Street, for supplying that District with water. During the summer they have laid 12,526 feet of pipes, and 173 dwellings and manufactories are now in the enjoyment of a copious supply of water from Fair Mount. The suit existing between the City and the Commissioners of Spring Garden, in relation to ground on Coates's Street, has not yet been settled; so soon as the case shall have been decided, it will become expedient for the safety of the Water Works, to complete the ice-breaker, guard-pier, and such other barriers as will hereafter ensure the entire safety of the works during extensive water or ice freshets.

The Committee have closed the agreement with the Fair Mount Bridge Company for the purchase of their lot north of the bridge, and adjoining the ground belonging to the City. Councils, at the time of authorizing this purchase, also directed the Committee to make sale of a lot of ground formerly used for the passage of the twenty inch iron main, leading from the Union Canal towing-path into Callowhill Street, at Schuylkill Second Street. This lot was offered at public sale, at the Exchange, in June last, but as there was not then any bid reaching the limit put upon it, it was concluded best to retain it until its value (being near the Columbia Rail Road) shall be better known.

Since the last Report, every honourable effort has been made to settle the difference existing between the City and the Schuylkill Navigation Company, but without success, and there appears no other resource but for the Committee to make application to the Legislature for a law legalizing the contracts made in good faith by the City.

In closing this Report, the Committee have great pleasure in stating that all the works under their care are in good order, and that our City now has within its control an abundant supply of pure, wholesome water, not only valuable for the preservation of the health of the community, but inestimable for the protecting us against the ravages of fire.
